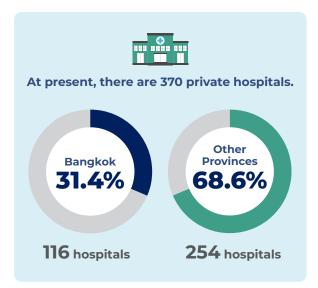
In line with the trend of "medical tourism" which is popular among tourists from around the world, the Global Wellness Institute has estimated that the market for medical tourism in Asia is set to grow at the rate of 13% a year. Medical services attract foreigners, include aesthetics, gender affirmation surgeries, osteopathy, cardiovascular, fertility treatment, and dentistry. Besides this, Thailand aims to enhance the standards of Thai massage for it to become a World Heritage and create a branding for Thailand as the Global Top of Mind Destination on Medical and Wellness. As people place more importance on looking after their health, private hospitals have accelerated their proactive marketing strategy on comprehensive health and wellness centers such as BDMS Wellness Clinic (Bangkok Hospital Group), VitalLife Scientific Wellness Center (Bumrungrad Hospital Group), and Medical City (Thonburi Hospital Group). The above factors will help support the long-term growth of the market for Thai medical tourism.





In addition, to that, Thai government prescribes the Medical Industry as part of the New Targeted S-Curve Industries. The government will provide benefits including tax reduction to attract investors to take part in several activities including the establishment of bases for research and production of medicines and medical innovations, providing private hospitals with benefits from lower costs of factors of the production which will be lower than the imported materials. International competitiveness will increase. Moreover, being part of the new S-Curve will strengthen the already growing medical tourism sector. Recently, the government has accelerated is processes of issuing more investment incentives to accommodate the growing need for medical products. The government has also endorsed the establishment of a global hub on genomics medicine and encouraged the private sector in industrial estates to open hospitals to cope with the increasing demand of the people who live in industrial estates.

Private hospitals can be divided into 3 categories in accordance with their sizes which are measured by the number of beds, signifying their service capabilities.
